

# Busting the Myth around Private Schooling!



#### **School Size**



I wanted to share some of this information with our parents and school community, and encourage them that they are an important part of the largest growing education sector in NSW. 
In 2022, the Independent Sector was larger than the Catholic Sector for the first time ever, and over the last 10 years, almost half of all new students in NSW, across all sectors, enrolled into an independent school. Quite simply, that means almost half of all parents, wanted to send their kids to a private independent school. You can see this information clearly on the graphs below. We believe parents should always have the right to choose how their children are educated in line with their values or ethos. More specifically, we believe that parents should always have access to a Christian environment that honours Christ and reflects and honours the beliefs they have instilled in their homes. This is also why we believe it is important for us to retain the right to employ staff who will honour and support the choices made by parents.




Interestingly, when society hears the term, "private or independent school," they think of expensive, state of the art, large campuses with thousands of students supported by wealthy parents and benefactors. The truth is almost the opposite! Of the 500+ Independent NSW schools, over 60 % of them have less than 500 students, with many having less than 200 students. And 48% of those students across 244 independent schools, come from families with some of the lowest socio-economic rankings, (sometimes referred to as a DMI.) Our school, and our area, according to our census and government data, falls into this lower ranking.

What does all this actually mean? It means, that despite the narrative around private schools, quite often they are small schools, who rely incredibly heavily on government funding to operate, and that the "capacity to contribute" or CTC, from parents, is much lower.

This brings me to another misconception that we encounter as a private independent school – that apparently independent schooling has more money and takes funding from public schooling. The reality is far from this, with nearly half of the schools with, what is classified as low fee schools.



I've included a more detailed resource from the CSA in this newsletter too. It explains how the government funding is distributed. Basically, all students, across all sectors, receive a base amount regardless of their school type. Then there are loadings added regarding socioeconomic factors, and/or regional settings. This amount is awarded per students across all sectors. However, the Independent School is then adjusted according to the "capacity to contribute" of parents decided by the socioeconomic ranking of the area. This amount is deducted and independent schools are forced to recoup those dollars through school fees. Basically, our school funding is mostly supplied through the government funding per students, minus an amount determined by the economy of

# Nationally Consistent Collection of Data

Dear parents, guardians and carers

Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD guidelines* (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- · year of schooling
- category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- · formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational
  outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. #### **FACT SHEET FOR PARENTS, GUARDIANS AND CARERS**

#### WHAT IS THE NCCD?

The Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD) takes place every year.

The NCCD is a collection that counts:

- the number of school students receiving an adjustment or 'help' due to disability
- the level of adjustment they are receiving to access education on the same basis as other students.

Students are counted in the NCCD if they receive ongoing adjustments at school due to disability. This 'help' allows them to access education on the same basis as a child without disability. The NCCD uses the definition of disability in the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992*.

Schools provide this information to education authorities.

Go to What is a reasonable adjustment? below to learn about adjustments.

# WHY IS THIS DATA BEING COLLECTED?

All schools in Australia must collect information about students with disability.

#### The NCCD:

- ensures that the information collected is transparent, consistent and reliable
- provides better information that improves understanding of students with disability
- allows parents, guardians, carers, teachers, principals, education authorities and government to better support students with disability.

#### Student with disability loading

Funding from the Australian Government for students with disability is based on the NCCD through the student with disability loading.

Students with disability who are counted in the top three levels of the NCCD (extensive, substantial and supplementary) attract the loading. Funding is based on a per-student amount at each of the three levels of additional support. The amount of the loading reflects the level of support students with disability need to participate fully in school, with higher funding for those who need higher levels of support.

Australian Government recurrent school funding is provided as a lump sum to school authorities including state and territory governments, which can then distribute the funding to their member schools according to their own needs-based arrangements.

The Government expects schools and school systems to consider their funding from all sources (ie Australian Government, state and territory and private) and prioritise their spending to meet the educational needs of all of their students, including students with disability.

# WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF THE NCCD FOR STUDENTS?

The information collected by the NCCD helps teachers, principals, education authorities and governments to better support students with disability at school.

The NCCD encourages schools to review their learning and support systems and processes. This helps schools to continually improve education outcomes for all students.




